Anne M. Lipton, M.D., Ph.D.

Dr. Anne Lipton is a board-certified neurologist with specialization in dementia. She is a member of the Cariloop Advisory Board and the American Academy of Neurology. Lipton obtained her undergraduate degree in Behavioral Biology with Honors at the Johns Hopkins University. Soon after earning her M.D. and Ph.D. at Northwestern University Medical School, Lipton performed her medical internship at the Johns Hopkins/Sinai Hospital of Baltimore program. She then completed her Neurology residency and fellowship training at the University of Texas-Southwestern and the University of California, Los Angeles. Lipton was selected as one of the Best Doctors in America by Best Doctors, Inc., one of the nation's most influential doctors by USA Today, and a Texas Monthly Super Doctor. She has written and edited numerous medical articles, chapters, and books and is the lead author of *The Common Sense Guide to Dementia for Clinicians and Caregivers*.

Pam Kovacs Johnson

Pam Kovacs Johnson has spent most of her life working in long term care, dedicated to meeting the needs of older adults and their families. During the past 44 years, she has held numerous positions in the field of aging as well as serving as the Director of Development for the Alzheimer's Association - Greater Dallas Chapter. Pam teaches Alzheimer's/dementia caregiving classes for family caregivers, as well as presents community service programs for local churches and civic organizations. She is the Founder of Friends Place Adult Day Services, Inc. and served as the Executive Director of the Richardson location, for 12 years. The center offers specialized daytime care, services and programs for individuals with memory problems, Alzheimer's, Dementia, and Parkinson's disease. In 2008, she became the primary caregiver for her father that was diagnosed with Alzheimer's and vascular dementia. Currently, Pam is working on a guidebook for dementia family caregivers titled, *Caring with Love, Honor and Respect*.

Trung Nguyen, M.D., Ph.D.

Dr. Trung Nguyen is a Neurologist at UTSW Medical Center in Dallas, Texas. He graduated with a B.E. in Biomedical Engineering from Vanderbilt University and received his M.D. in Medicine and Ph.D. in Neuroscience from The University of Texas Medical Branch. Nguyen completed his residency in Neurology at Emory University. He served as Assistant Instructor and is now a current Assistant Professor in the Neurology and Neurotherapeutics department at The University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center. Nguyen is currently an attending physician in the Neurology at Parkland Memorial Hospital, Zale Lipshy Hospital, and Clements University Hospital. Nguyen is currently on the advisory board for the Alzheimer's Association, Greater Dallas Chapter and has published many research articles focusing on Alzheimer's, Dementia, etc. Nguyen is a sought-after physician and has over seven years of diverse experience and expertise in Neurology.

Cindy Marshall, M.D.

Dr. Cindy Marshall joined Baylor Health Care System in as Medical Director of Baylor Memory Center. Marshall has been in practice since 2003 and has a special interest in treatment of the memory, mood and behavioral problems associated with Alzheimer's disease. Marshall earned her first medical degree from the University at Alabama at Birmingham.
